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The NFHS Voice: Title IX Continues to Fuel Growth of Girls and Women's Sports, Olympic Dominance

To say that American female athletes dominated the recent Olympics in Tokyo would be an understatement.

Among the 66 medals earned by American female Olympians – most by any country in the history of the Games – were gold-medal performances by the U.S. basketball, volleyball, water polo and beach volleyball teams. Eighteen medals were earned by the U.S. women swimmers, female track and field athletes claimed 15 medals, and the U.S. women's softball and soccer teams won silver and bronze medals, respectively.

In the past 30 years of the Olympic Games, the United States has dominated the women's team sports of basketball (nine golds), soccer (four golds, one silver, one bronze) and softball (three golds, two silvers)—not to mention the untold number of medals in track and field. And this past summer, the U.S. women's volleyball team claimed its first gold medal.

These performances by some of our nation's most skilled female athletes never would have been possible without the passage of Title IX and the offerings of these sports through our nation's schools. With the chance to play afforded by the landmark Title IX legislation in 1972, girls participation in several high school sports skyrocketed in the years that followed.

When the NFHS conducted its first participation survey in 1971, basketball and outdoor track and field were the primary girls sports, comprising about two-thirds of the 294,000 total. However, with the opportunity to play additional sports, girls flocked to volleyball and softball first, along with cross country and eventually soccer.

Soccer, in fact, has had the most remarkable growth. In 1971, only 700 girls were playing high school soccer. Twenty-five years later, that number had climbed to almost 210,000; and as the 50th anniversary of Title IX approaches, there are now almost 400,000 girls playing high school soccer – a staggering 56,200 percentage increase in 50 years. Soccer now ranks fourth in popularity among girls high school sports – all because of that opportunity in 1972.

There are many other success stories, however. The pre-Title IX survey in 1971 indicated that 1,719 girls were participating in cross country. With increases every year until 2015, today, there are 219,345 girls competing in high school programs and the sport ranks sixth in popularity.

Although participation numbers have leveled a bit the past 10 years, fast-pitch softball is another sport that flourished after the passage of Title IX. With fewer than 10,000 participants in 1971, the numbers quickly rose to 220,000 by 1985 and 343,000 by 2000, and softball is currently fifth among girls sports with 362,038 participants.

Since track and field and basketball were the primary sports in the early days of girls sports programs, increases in those sports have not been as dramatic; however, they remain the first and third most-popular sports, respectively, today. Volleyball, however, much like soccer, continues its upward climb.

Without a doubt, volleyball has seen the steadiest increases among girls high school sports the past 50 years. After starting with 17,952 participants in 1971, the numbers jumped to 300,810 by 1990 and 409,332 by 2010 and 452, 808 by 2018. During its climb, volleyball surpassed basketball as the No. 2 girls sport.

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2022 & 2023 NSAA Football Scheduling Timeline

The classification period and schedules will be for two years – the **2022** and **2023** football seasons for Classes A-B-C1-C2-D1-D2-D6.

The scheduling timeline is dependent upon receiving the enrollment figures the NSAA member schools report to the Nebraska Department of Education in the fall of 2021. In past years, these figures have been available to the NSAA sometime in early December.

The TENTATIVE schedule will be as follows:

- November 1st, 2021 Deadline to submit application for a cooperative sponsorship in football for the 2022 and 2023 seasons. <u>No cooperative sponsorships in football for the 2022 and 2023 football</u> seasons will be accepted or permitted after November 1st, 2021.
- 2. **November 2021** Football coops will be approved for the 2022 and 2023 football seasons at the November NSAA Board of Directors meeting.
- 3. **November 30**th, **2021 –** The deadline for schools to submit their declaration of participation in 11-man, 8-man or 6-man football. **This is also the deadline for schools to submit their intent (via email) to "Opt Up" or "Opt Down" in classification.**
 - Those schools with a BOY three-grade enrollment (9th-11th grades) in excess of 47 as submitted in September of 2021 are not eligible for the 8-man football playoffs in 2022 and 2023, unless they're within the one-classification waiver period. A school that is ineligible for the playoffs in the 2022 & 2023 cycle can become eligible in the second season (2023) if their BOY enrollment figure is 47 or lower as submitted in September of 2022. (If you have questions, please contact the NSAA office.)
 - Those schools with a BOY three-grade enrollment (9th-11th grades) in excess of 27 as submitted in September of 2021 are not eligible for the 6-man football playoffs in 2022 and 2023, unless they're within the one-classification waiver period. A school that is ineligible for the playoffs in the 2022 & 2023 cycle can become eligible in the second season (2023) if their BOY enrollment figure is 27 or lower as submitted in September of 2022. (If you have questions, please contact the NSAA office.)
 - A school that opts down in classification and is thus ineligible for the playoffs in the 2022 & 2023 cycle can become eligible in the second season (2023) if their boy enrollment figure as submitted in September of 2022 falls within the appropriate classification enrollment range.
- 4. December Classifications and district assignments for the 2022 and 2023 football seasons will be released. Schools will then be asked to submit a priority list of non-district schools they would like to have on their 2022 and 2023 football schedules. More detailed information and instructions regarding this process will be provided after classifications and district assignments are released.
- 5. **January/February 2022 –** The NSAA staff will establish the football schedules for the 2022 and 2023 football seasons for all member schools in Classes A-B-C1-C2-D1-D2-D6.
- 6. **February 9th, 2022 –** The schedules along with the home and away designations for Classes A-B-C1-C2-D1-D2-D6 will be released to the member schools. More detailed instructions will be provided at a later time.

activities. Because Kearney Catholic is a small school (class C-1), it is easy to get involved. I am a part of the football, basketball, and track teams along with participating in One Act, Quiz Bowl, and National Honors Society. Although the school year is just getting started, I have already noticed that the Kearney community is beginning to shift from the chaos that was the COVID-19 era back to something even better than our normal, pre-COVID-19 lifestyle.

Everyone talks about wanting to "get back to normal" but I would argue that our new normal is far better than the one we had prior to the pandemic. All the shutdowns and regulations of the past year and a half have really opened my eyes to not take the little things for granted. How to Find the Right Fit? Footwear is Fundamental for Each Athlete

From Nike to Air Jordan to Brooks to Adidas, the options are endless for footwear for athletes. Many companies even offer the ability to custom design shoes with whatever color you want and whatever saying you feel necessary. When approaching the decision of which shoe to purchase for an athlete, many factors come in to play. Although many athletes number one priority is how the shoe looks, the factors that should be considered include: the sport the athlete is participating in, proper fit specific to the athlete's foot and any past injuries that athlete has suffered from.

Often young athletes look up to professional players as role models. They may seek out a "cool" looking shoe or a shoe that an NBA star wears regularly, rather than footwear that is unique to their situation. It is important to explain and remind the young athletes that the proper footwear needs to be specific to their athletic goals, promote support and comfort, and help reduce injury.

When purchasing footwear, the shoe should provide support and comfort for the activity the athlete will be participating in, the athlete's foot type, and athlete's gait analysis. It is vital to consider all aspects of the sport when choosing footwear. Is there a need for spikes or cleats? A high-top shoe versus a low top shoe? Will the athlete be running multiple miles or at a shorter distance? The athlete's foot type should also be considered during the selection process. The types of feet can range from a wide foot versus a narrow foot to a foot with a high arch versus a foot that has excessive pronation. The shoe should provide support and absorb shock for the heel. It is essential to account for the athlete's gait when choosing a shoe as well. Speaking to a professional about the athlete's gait is recommended.

Understanding the skills of the sport and the role the shoe has in performing those specific skills is important to reduce injury. For example, in distance running, an athlete will be following a running regimen that will require them to run a specific amount of miles to reach their goal. It is important to select a shoe that is comfortable while they run and is specific to their foot. It is also important for the athlete to track the mileage in the specific shoes to know when to replace them in order to avoid overuse injuries.

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



Required Courses for ALL Coaches & Activities Sponsors

All coaches and activities sponsors are required to take the three NFHS courses at least once every three years. The bylaw now states:

All coaches and volunteers and activity sponsors are required to complete the NFHS Concussion in Sports, Heat Illness Prevention and Sudden Cardiac Arrest Training courses at least once every three years. First year coaches and sponsors are required to complete all three courses prior to the start of the activity season which they are to coach.

Medical Personnel at Regular Season Contests

Severe injuries, sudden illnesses and other critical incidents do not often occur during school activities, but it is important for every school to have an emergency action plan (EAP) for administrators, faculty, coaches, and staff members to follow should emergencies occur. Due to lack of universal availability of medical coverage and other logistical reasons, NSAA does not require that schools have a physician, trainer or ambulance on-site at regular season activities; however, each school should have a plan in place should there be an emergency involving students, coaches, officials or spectators requiring medical attention.

A Reminder to Compete with Respect

Concerns have been expressed regarding the lack of respect being afforded to students, coaches, officials, spectators, and host staff. Schools should understand the seriousness of their responsibility to everyone and the privilege of representing their school and community. As educators, we must recommit ourselves to the preservation of respect. Unfair acts prohibited by the spirit and intent of the rules include the use of disconcerting acts or words.

Deliberately disrespecting the rules and fellow participants in the hope or expectation of gaining an advantage is deplorable and indefensible. It is imperative that administrators, coaches, officials, and students make an extra effort to model the type of behavior that illustrates the educational values of activity participation. Conduct that berates, intimidates, or threatens anyone, based on gender, ethnicity, or sexual preference is unacceptable.

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Statement of Principle on Conduct Synopsis

Adopted by the NDE, NSAA, NCSA, NASB, NSEA, NRCSA, NCA and NSIAAA

Recently, students in our schools have been experiencing negative, harassing, and bullying conduct during the school day, and at school activities by the spectators attending those events or, and at times by opponents in an activity, that is directed at the school's participants and spectators, often with a racial component. Such conduct is unacceptable and does not reflect the foregoing basic tenants of our society.

It is the responsibility of our organizations to promote and respect the liberty interests of all persons who may participate in or attend any educational endeavor sponsored by our organizations which includes ensuring that common courtesy is shown for all persons, insuring tranquility for all, and being responsible that no one person abuses their liberties to the detriment of other persons.

As the educational leaders of Nebraska's school system, we firmly support Nebraska schools and communities in proactively involving teachers, administrators, students, parents, and community members in developing and maintaining a positive school and community culture that supports learning opportunities for all persons, and ensures that respect and courtesy are shown to all persons.

Conduct by any person that does not show respect for and courtesy of other persons in Nebraska schools and any school activity is prohibited and shall not be tolerated – period.

Requirements for Ejected Coaches & Players

Enforcement of the "sit-out rule" for ejections from high school contests for unsportsmanlike conduct is a responsibility of the member school. Failure to properly enforce this rule could result in other sanctions by the NSAA.

Administrators will be expected to promptly file a report with the NSAA whenever a participant or coach from their school has been ejected from any high school contest. Such filing must be done online under the AD login section of the NSAA website. Enforcement of the "sit-out rule" is expected to begin immediately, regardless whether it is regular-season or tournament play.

Any athlete ejected from a contest for unsportsmanlike conduct shall be ineligible for the next athletic contest at that level of competition and any other athletic contest at any level during the interim. Any athlete ejected for a second time during a season from a contest for unsportsmanlike conduct shall be ineligible for the next two contests at that level of competition and all other athletic contests at any level during the interim. Any athlete ejected for a third time during a season from a contest for unsportsmanlike conduct shall be ineligible for the next three contests at that level of competition and all other athletic contests at any level during the interim, in addition to other penalties the NSAA or school may assess. During the time of their "sit-out" suspension, athletes who are ejected for unsportsmanlike conduct may not suit up or participate, but it is the school's discretion whether such athlete is able to travel with the team or sit on the team bench. (The athlete is permitted to practice per school's discretion.)

Coaches who are ejected for the first time will be required to sit-out the next contest at that level, plus all other contests at any level during the interim. Coaches may not be present at the contest site during the time of their "sit-out" suspension. The coach will also be required to successfully complete the NFHS online course "TEACHING AND MODELING BEHAVIOR" within 10 days of the ejection.

Coaches who are ejected a second time in a season will be required to sit-out the next two contests at that level, plus all other contests at any level during the interim. Coaches may not be present at the contest site during the time of their "sit-out" suspension. The coach will also be required to successfully complete the NFHS online course "FUNDAMENTALS OF COACHING" within 10 days of the ejection.

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Coach & Sponsor Certification

NSAA Bylaw 2.12 stipulates, "In order to serve as a head or assistant coach or sponsor of any activity sponsored by the NSAA, the individual must possess a valid Nebraska Teaching Certificate or Nebraska Administrative and Supervisory Certificate and have a written contract of employment as a coach or sponsor with the schools in which he/she is to perform these duties." Yes, this does include coaches/directors/sponsors/advisers in the non-athletic activities as well: Play Production, Music, Speech and Journalism.

Individuals that do not possess either of the certificates listed above, may serve as a head or assistant as long as they successfully complete the requirements for a Special Services Coaching Permit (NSAA Bylaw 2.12.2). This information can be found on the NSAA webpage under the Coaches tab. It is important to remember that certification is not complete until the individual has applied and received their certificate from the Nebraska Department of Education Certification Office. Schools should request a copy of the certificate and have it on file at the school.

Non-certified personnel may be contracted by the school, but such personnel shall be Coaches Aides. (NSAA Bylaw 2.12.3). There are restrictions and limitations for Coaches Aides. Refer to the respective Bylaw for a complete listing in regard to Coaches Aides.

Are your officials on the NSAA Officials Roster?

3.12.2 Officials for Varsity Contests.

Only those officials who are registered with the Association may be used by member high schools to officiate varsity competition in football, baseball, basketball, wrestling, soccer, softball and volleyball competition, and start track & field meets.

Athletic Directors are expected to confirm that all officials hired to officiate varsity contests have been classified by the NSAA. The NSAA Officials Roster is available on your AD login page under **NSAA OFFICIALS & JUDGES**.

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
