NOTICE TO COMPETITORS

(This information supplements the Local Rules and Terms of the Competition for 2022 NSAA Golf Championships & Events)

- 1. Abnormal Course Conditions, including, Ground Under Repair: include, but are not limited to:
- a. Decorative Flower and Plant Beds.
- b. Rubber mulch (shredded tires) associated with cart paths, have the same status of rocks and are deemed to be loose impediments.
- c. Bare areas of dirt, brown areas of sod, newly sodded areas, and trenches associated with new irrigation installation, are ground under repair even though not defined by white lines.
- d. Areas of damage caused by animals (i.e. raccoons, skunks and the like) digging for grubs are treated as ground under repair from which relief is allowed under Rule 16.1b, but interference does not exist if the damage only interferes with the player's stance.
- 2. <u>Circle 10 Scoring</u>: Once a participant reaches 11 strokes or more, the participant has the option to pick up their ball, wait for the others to finish the hole and then move on to the next hole to continue play. The player who "picks up" their ball will be able to continue their round but is disqualified from the individual competition and their score is ineligible for that round's team score.
- 3. Immovable Obstructions: include, but are not limited to:
- a. Staked Trees.
- b. Artificially surfaced roads and paths, including those surfaced with crushed brick, gravel or asphalt.
- Immovable obstructions adjacent to, within or abutting each other, such as artificially surfaced paths (including decorative areas
 enclosed by these paths), curbing, walls, steps and drains, are considered a single obstruction.
- d. Permanent restrooms and structures, including adjacent and surrounding artificially surfaced paths, patios, and decorative plantings, are considered a single obstruction.
- e. White painted lamp posts right of Hole #10 used to identify but not define out of bounds.
- **4.** Movable Obstructions: include, but are not limited to:
- a. Yardage posts.
- b. Staking and roping; trash cans; and benches.
- c. White stakes used to identify but not define out of bounds.

5. <u>Out of Bounds</u>:

- a. Out of Bounds is defined by white lines in addition to white stakes and fence posts. When defined by white lines, the line itself is out of bounds. When both white stakes and white lines exist, the stakes identify out of bounds and the lines define out of bounds.
- **6.** Play-Off to Determine Champion: In the event of a tie for the individual or team champion, there will be a hole-by-hole play-off until a winner is determined. Holes to be used for the play-off include 13, 14 and 18 unless otherwise notified by the Committee. See the NSAA Golf Manual for play-off procedure.
- 7. <u>Teeing Ground</u>: Gold tee markers define the teeing area for the competition.
- 8. Scoring Area: A player's scorecard is deemed to be returned when the player has left the scoring room.
- 9. Final Decisions on Any Disputed Points: will be made by Jon Dolliver, NSAA; Justin Ahrens, NGA and Tom Johnson, Norfolk CC.
